### **Overview**

NXP<sup>®</sup> delivers the Smart Application Blueprint for Rapid Engineering (SABRE) board based on i.MX7Dual applications processor, utilizing both the ARM<sup>®</sup> Cortex<sup>®</sup>-A7 and Cortex<sup>®</sup>-M4 cores with enhanced security and power optimization.

With the goal of faster time to market, the SABRE board allows developers to evaluate the processors' primary features including hardware-enabled security, integrated EPD controller, LCD/HDMI/MIPI DSI display and flexible connectivity interface, plus rich on-board solutions to Wi-Fi<sup>®</sup>/Bluetooth<sup>®</sup>4.0+EDR (Supporting BLE), and dual 1 Gigabit Ethernet.

The corresponding software support enables developers to run a rich operating system like  $Linux^{\text{(B)}}$  or Android<sup>TM</sup> on the ARM<sup>(B)</sup> Cortex<sup>(B)</sup>-A7 core and FreeRTOS on the ARM<sup>(B)</sup> Cortex<sup>(B)</sup>-M4 core, exploring the full potential of the Heterogeneous Multicore Processing (HMP) architecture.

L4.1.0\_1.1.0\_GA BSP release can support i.MX7D SABRE board. <u>Developing uboot</u> and <u>Developing Kernel</u> on public git may provide better support.

# Instructions



## 1.1 Get Familiar with the Board

## 1.2 Insert the SD Card

The kit comes with an SD card with a pre-built NXP<sup>®</sup> Linux binary demo image. Without modifying the system, booting from the image will provide a default system with certain features for building other applications on top of Linux.

To understand more about NXP Linux/Android/FreeRTOS BSP, please continue reading the next sections.

# **1.3 Connect USB Debug Cable**

Connect the micro-B end of the supplied USB cable into Debug UART port J509. Connect the other end of the cable to a host computer.

Terminal window configuration: 115200 baud, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, no parity

## **1.4 Connect User Interface Devices**

Connect monitor via the HDMI connector (J9). To interact with the user interface displayed on the monitor it may be desirable to attach a keyboard and/or a mouse in the USB port (J26).

# **1.5 Verify Boot Switches**

By default, both of the two boot switches (SW2 and SW3) are configured to zero position. With the SD card inserted, the board will boot from the SD card. Without the SD card inserted, the board will be switched into serial downloader mode required by manufacturing tool (MFGTools). If any other boot source is desired, please refer to the silkscreen on the board near the switches.

# **1.6 Connect Power Supply**

Connect the 5V power supply cable to the 5V DC power jack (J1).

When powered on by flipping the switch, the processor starts executing code from on-chip ROM. With default Boot Switch setup, this code reads the fuses to find out which media to search for a bootable image. Then it will find the SD card and begin U-Boot execution automatically.

Information will be printed in the COM9 (smaller number) serial console for A7 core. If you don't stop the U-boot process, it will boot the Linux kernel.
