The NP75N04VUK is N-channel MOS Field Effect Transistor designed for high current switching applications.





TEST CIRCUIT 2 SWITCHING TIME





DERATING FACTOR OF FORWARD BIAS SAFE OPERATING AREA




TOTAL POWER DISSIPATION vs. CASE TEMPERATURE




T_C - Case Temperature - °C

TRANSIENT THERMAL RESISTANCE vs. PULSE WIDTH










DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. DRAIN CURRENT

 $\rm T_{ch}$ - Channel Temperature - $^{\circ}\rm C$




FORWARD TRANSFER CHARACTERISTICS



DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. GATE TO SOURCE VOLTAGE








DRAIN TO SOURCE ON-STATE RESISTANCE vs. CHANNEL TEMPERATURE




SWITCHING CHARACTERISTICS



SOURCE TO DRAIN DIODE FORWARD VOLTAGE




CAPACITANCE vs. DRAIN TO SOURCE VOLTAGE



REVERSE RECOVERY TIME vs. DRAIN CURRENT





Remark: Strong electric field, when exposed to this device, can cause destruction of the gate oxide and ultimately degrade the device operation. Steps must be taken to stop generation of static electricity as much as possible, and quickly dissipate it once, when it has occurred.
